Re: SB 402 Public Notice and Voting Rights Restoration Database

Dear Senator Rodrigues:

The First Amendment Foundation writes in opposition to Senate Bill 402, which will reduce the number of Floridians who see judicial notices by removing legal notifications from newspapers to a website established by the Supreme Court.

Moving notices exclusively to the internet will particularly affect Floridians with limited broadband access, many living in rural communities. In some rural counties, more than 50 percent of residents <u>lack adequate access</u>. Due to income inequalities, many people living in urban areas lack reliable internet access and smartphones. This bill will leave poor and rural Floridians without adequate access to legal notifications and notifications by county clerks.

Newspapers, through print and the web, reach a greater audience than government websites. In fact, the newspaper audience in Florida is 10 times larger than most city or county websites. Currently, readers see notices while looking for other information in the paper or online. Under Senate Bill 402, only those who seek out a new government website will be aware of legal notices.

Moreover, publication in newspapers allows for third-party verification of notice. At present, newspapers must verify that government notices were published on time. Senate Bill 402 is silent regarding verification, making it harder to ensure government entities have met notice deadlines, included critical information, and did not hide notice.

This bill limits who sees legal notices – adversely affecting poor and rural Floridians -- and removes verification from an

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independent party to a government entity or contractor. Accordingly, FAF opposes Senate Bill 402.
